## Mission Statement

To provide and promote public safety through efficient and effective offender custody, care, control and treatment consistent with sound correctional principles and constitutional practices.

Commissioner Christopher B. Epps is the longest serving commissioner of the Mississippi Department of Corrections. He was first appointed by then-Democratic Gov. Ronnie Musgrove on Aug. 30, 2002, and reappointed on Jan. 13, 2004, by then-Republican Gov. Haley Barbour, who served two terms. On Jan.11, 2012, Republican Gov. Phil Bryant reappointed him.

Commissioner Epps is a nationally recognized leader in corrections. He currently serves as president of the American Correctional Association (ACA), the oldest and largest international correctional association in the world. He is in high demand as a motivator and has been featured in such nationally recognized publications as The New York Times and Time magazine and appeared on the CBS Evening News in May. He has appeared before the United States Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on the Constitution, Civil Rights and Human Rights, testifying in June 2012 on the issue of solitary confinement. Through his leadership, Mississippi has become a model for corrections reform.

Commissioner Epps started his career with the Department of Corrections in 1982 as a correctional officer at the Mississippi State Penitentiary at Parchman. He has since served extensively with the agency, holding several positions, including chief of staff, deputy commissioner of institutions, deputy commissioner of Community Corrections, director of Offender Services, deputy superintendent, chief of security, corrections case management supervisor, director of treatment services, corrections case manager, disciplinary hearing officer/investigator and director of records.

Commissioner Epps has held numerous leadership positions in corrections and in the military. Before being elected president of the ACA in May 2010, he had served as auditor. He also had been elected to the Commission on Accreditation in 2004 and as treasurer in 2008, a position that placed him on the ACA Executive Committee. In addition to his leadership with ACA, he is vice president of the Association of State Correctional Administrators (ASCA) and becomes president in August 2014. He also has been ASCA treasurer.

Commissioner Epps received an honorable discharge from the Mississippi National Guard in March 2008, when he retired as a lieutenant colonel, having served in the armed forces since 1984.

In addition to the ACA and the ASCA, Commissioner Epps' correctional affiliations include the North American Association of Wardens and Superintendents (NAAWS), the Southern States Correctional Association (SSCA), the Mississippi Association of Professionals in Corrections (MAPC), and the Correctional Peace Officers Foundation (CPOF). He is past president of the SSCA, former chairman of the Mississippi Wireless Communications Commission and served as chairman of the Corrections and Criminal Justice Task Force. He currently serves on the Correctional Peace Officers Foundation National Board of Directors, the Mississippi Prison Industries, the Mississippi Drug Court Advisory Committee, the Mississippi Analysis and Information Center, the Mississippi



Broadband Connect Coalition, the Council of Advisors for the College of Public Service at Jackson State University, the State Workforce Investment Board, and the Interstate Commission for Adult Offender Supervision. He formerly served as a member of the Board of Directors of Alcohol Services and as a mentor with Big Brother /Big Sister of Mississippi.

Commissioner Epps' list of accomplishments and awards also is as numerous. In December 2012, he was honored as the nation's Outstanding Corrections Commissioner for 2011 with the Michael Francke Award from the ASCA. Further honors include: Humanitarian of the Year in 2007 by the MAPC; the Criminal Justice Professional of the Year Award for 2000, 2004 and 2013 by the MAPC; the 2007 Distinguished Alumni Award from the National Association for Equal Opportunity in Higher Education; one of the "50 Most Influential African Americans in Mississippi" by BlackMississippi.com; The Distinguished Public Service Award by the University of Southern Mississippi, Department of Criminal Justice, in 2004; the 2013 Community Anchor Award in Government from Mount Helm Baptist Church; and the Whitney M. Young Jr. Service Award of the Andrew Jackson Council Boy Scouts of America. In 2007, then-Kentucky Gov. Ernie Fletcher awarded him the honorary title "Kentucky Colonel." In July 2013, he received the Arkansas Traveler Award to serve as an Ambassador of Good Will from Arkansas.

Additional honors include: an Army Commendations Medal; Army Achievement Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster; Army Reserve Component Achievement Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster; National Defense Service Medal; NCO Professional Development Ribbon; Army Service Ribbon; Mississippi Medal of Efficiency; Mississippi War Medal; and the Mississippi Longevity Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster. Commissioner Epps has received four separate Mississippi House of Representatives and Senate commendations: House Concurrent Resolution 114 recognizing him for dedicated and outstanding service to the MDOC and recognition for being the longest serving commissioner in the history of the agency, 2009; House Concurrent Resolution 143 upon his national acclaim and respect of his peers, as evidenced by his election as the 102nd president of the ACA, 2011; Senate Concurrent Resolution 551 saluting him during Black History Month as the longest-serving Mississippi Department of Corrections commissioner and as the recipient of the Michael Francke Award, 2011; and Senate Concurrent Resolution 552 congratulating him on the occasion of his investiture as the 102nd president of the American Correctional Association.

A native of Tchula, Mississippi, Commissioner Epps earned a bachelor's degree in elementary education from Mississippi Valley State University in Itta Bena and a master's degree in guidance counseling from Liberty University in Lynchburg, Va.

He currently is a deacon at the Hanging Moss Road Church of Christ in Jackson, Mississippi. He is married to Catherlean Sanders Epps, and they have two sons, Chris and Tracey.





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# Deputy Commissioners



Richard D. McCarty  
Division of Administration and Finance

Richard D. McCarty has served as the Deputy Commissioner of Administration & Finance since January 1999. Prior to his appointment to Deputy Commissioner, McCarty was the Fiscal Comptroller for the agency. McCarty has worked for MDOC since June 1989. He received a Bachelor of Science in Accounting degree from Belhaven College in 1983. After graduation, he worked in the field of public accounting. He received his CPA License in 1986 and is a member of the Mississippi Society of Public Accountants. Some his accomplishments at MDOC are:

- Implementation of a fully automated perpetual inventory system for all agency warehouses.
- Coordination of the Statewide Automated Accounting System.
- Implementation of the Statewide Inmate Banking and Commissary System for which the Agency won the 2000 Award for Creative Excellence from the National Association of Governmental Administrators.



Jerry Williams  
Division of Community Corrections

Jerry Williams is the Deputy Commissioner of Community Corrections. He was appointed in July 2011. Prior to this assignment, he served in several positions with MDOC including Region III Community Corrections director; MDOC liaison for a transitional facility; branch director II-American Correctional Association manager for Community Corrections; Central Office, Operation Management Analyst Principle; and Central Mississippi Correctional commander, correctional supervisor/MDOC liaison for Offender Health Care Services, sergeant and corrections officer at Central Mississippi Correctional Facility In 2008, ACA selected him as one of the Best of the Best Professionals in Corrections. Williams is a graduate of Jackson State University, with a BA in Sociology and MA in Sociology with an emphasis in Criminal Justice. He has served on an advisory board for several community organizations and is an Executive Gold Member with the ACA.



Archie Longley  
Division of Institutions

Archie Longley has served as the Deputy Commissioner of Institutions since April 2013. Longley has 25 years of extensive experience serving in federal correctional institutions throughout the United States. His past most immediate job was chief executive officer for the Federal Correctional Complex in Yazoo City, where he oversaw three facilities and directed a \$57 million budget while being responsible for 560 employees. Longley also was CEO at federal facilities in Pennsylvania and South Dakota. He began his career as a corrections officer at the former Boron Federal Prison Camp in Boron, Calif., and since has worked in five other states. A member of the American Correctional Association, he has received multiple awards for outstanding performance.

## Letter from the Commissioner

Dear Fellow Mississippians:

I am pleased to present the Mississippi Department of Corrections (MDOC) 2013 Annual Report. This report represents the scope and depth of the agency and its staff during fiscal 2013 (July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013). It also provides an in-depth profile of the state's felony population and MDOC's tradition of prudent accountability and excellence in public service.

On Jan. 28, I was sworn in as the 102nd president of the American Correctional Association, the oldest and largest international correctional association in the world with over 24,000 members. I am proud of that accomplishment as well as many others, including that Mississippi has attracted international attention because of the reforms we have made to our corrections system in the last 10 years. During fiscal 2013, MDOC hosted visitors from such countries as South Korea and Australia, and states including Virginia, Indiana, and New York, and the Federal Bureau of Prisons especially interested in how the state handles confinement of inmates from the general population, commonly referred to as administrative segregation, and illegal cell phone usage through Managed Access.

MDOC is committed to fiscal responsibility, and I look forward to the challenges we face together in the coming year. It is an honor to serve as your commissioner.

## Accomplishments

Here is a snapshot of some of the agency's other notable accomplishments in 2013 coupled with the prior fiscal year:

- Offenders in the Community Work Centers contributed \$16,019,136.00 in free labor to local, county, state and non-profit charitable organizations throughout the state during fiscal 2013. Also, offenders in the Joint County-State Work Programs contributed \$14,597,440 in free labor to local, county, state and non-profit charitable organizations.
- The recidivism rate is 28.39 percent over a three-year period.
- Educational programs offered to inmates in fiscal 2013 resulted in 4,551 inmates successfully completing the following programs: General Education Development (GED) – 493, Vocational Trades – 644 and Alcohol & Drug – 3,414.
- The Intensive Supervision Program (ISP) known as house arrest has resulted in an estimated total cost avoidance of \$69,768,381 from fiscal 2000-2013.
- Since its inception in 2004 under Section 47-7-4 of state law, the Conditional Medical Release Program has resulted in an estimated total cost avoidance of at least \$7,227,031 through the release of 109 terminally ill or bedridden inmates.
- MDOC has saved over \$24,232,766 from January 2009 through June 2013 as a result of the Division of Medicaid paying for services provided to Medicaid eligible inmates. MDOC reimburses Medicaid the state match portion of the provider statement.
- On Jan. 1, 2005 MDOC implemented a self-insured workers compensation program that has saved approximately \$3,400,000 since its inception.
- MDOC has saved approximately \$7,800,000 in field officers (probation and parole) salaries since June 2009 by requiring offenders to pay supervision fees electronically.
- Since 2000, MDOC has provided services to victims through the Division of Victim Services (DVS). The services include prior notification of inmate release; updates on inmate status; escort to parole board hearings; advocacy; victim/offender dialogue; assistance with protective orders, offender harassment, and law enforcement matters. Victims must be registered to receive these and other services. As of Aug. 31, 2013, DVS had 6,335 registrations. The agency also contributed \$750,499.87 to the Victim Compensation Fund.
- MDOC also assists victims/survivors through MS SAVIN, the Mississippi Statewide Automated Victim Information Notification program. This service, also available for law enforcement and others such as those registered with DVS, provides real time information on state inmates and offenders housed in participating county jails. At the end of fiscal 2013, 81 counties were involved with SAVIN. The program has 38,067 registrations, with 15,100 new registrations logged from July 2012 through June 2013. SAVIN also launched the Vine Mobile app for offender search and registration.

# PROGRAMS

The Division of Community Corrections is charged with supervising offenders under the jurisdiction of the state. The division conducts field supervision of offenders and oversees a variety of programs that afford offenders an opportunity to re-assimilate into the community. This Division is led by Deputy Commissioner Jerry Williams.

## **Field Services**

The Field Services component of the Division of Community Corrections is responsible for the supervision of offenders released on parole, intensive supervision (ISP), earned release supervision (ERS), medical release and those sentenced by the court to probation or ISP.

## **F.R.E.E. (Facing Reality Educationally and Emotionally)**

The MDOC Division of Community Corrections has thirteen F.R.E.E. program coordinators located statewide that assist field officers in monitoring offender's treatment needs for substance abuse. In addition, program coordinators teach a structured life skills curriculum twice a month to assist offenders in other areas of their life that have been affected by their substance abuse problems.

## **Interstate Compact**

The State of Mississippi participates in the Interstate Compact for Adult Offenders. Under the terms of the compact agreement, the Mississippi Department of Corrections (MDOC) provides courtesy supervision to probationers and parolees from other states in exchange for courtesy supervision of Mississippi offenders residing in other states.

## **Pre-Trial Diversion**

The Pre-Trial Diversion program is an alternative to felony conviction in which a defendant voluntarily submits to supervision ranging from six months to three years. Charges against the offender may be dismissed if the period of supervision is successfully completed.

## **Intensive Supervision Program**

The Intensive Supervision Program (ISP) is designed to provide a level of supervision in a community setting to offenders who would otherwise be incarcerated. Offenders are required to wear electronic monitoring equipment and are limited in most cases to employment, treatment, and worship services activities. Each offender in ISP maintains inmate status and can be immediately placed in an MDOC facility upon violation of the program.

## **Drug Testing**

Community Corrections field officers are responsible for routine and reasonable suspicion drug testing of offenders and random drug testing of 15% of the offender population each month.

## Restitution Centers

There are four Restitution Centers in Mississippi that assist residents in obtaining employment as a condition of their probationary sentence. Money earned by residents is distributed to crime victims for restitution, courts for court costs and fines, and MDOC for room and board. The remainder of the resident's wages, after taxes, goes to the resident's family or to the resident's holding account. Upon completion of the program, residents are transferred to a field officer and remain under supervision for the remainder of their probationary sentence.

## Community Work Centers

The MDOC Community Corrections Division oversees 17 Community Work Centers throughout Mississippi. Minimum security inmates are assigned to these centers and are provided a gradual, re-introduction into community life. The program includes alcohol and drug counseling, Adult Basic Education and GED preparation, literacy classes and religious programs.

Each Community Work Center houses approximately 102 inmates that perform a wide range of labor at no cost to city, county and state government agencies and to school districts. This work ranges from community beautification projects to bridge and road work repair, vehicle maintenance, and water, sewer, and sanitation details.

## Inmate Labor

In FY 2013, the offenders in the community work centers provided entities with 2,209,536 total inmate hours, valued at minimum wage to equal \$16,019,136 in free labor. For the same 12 months the residents in the restitution centers provided entities with 33,656 total resident community service work hours valued at minimum wage to equal approximately \$244,006 in free labor.

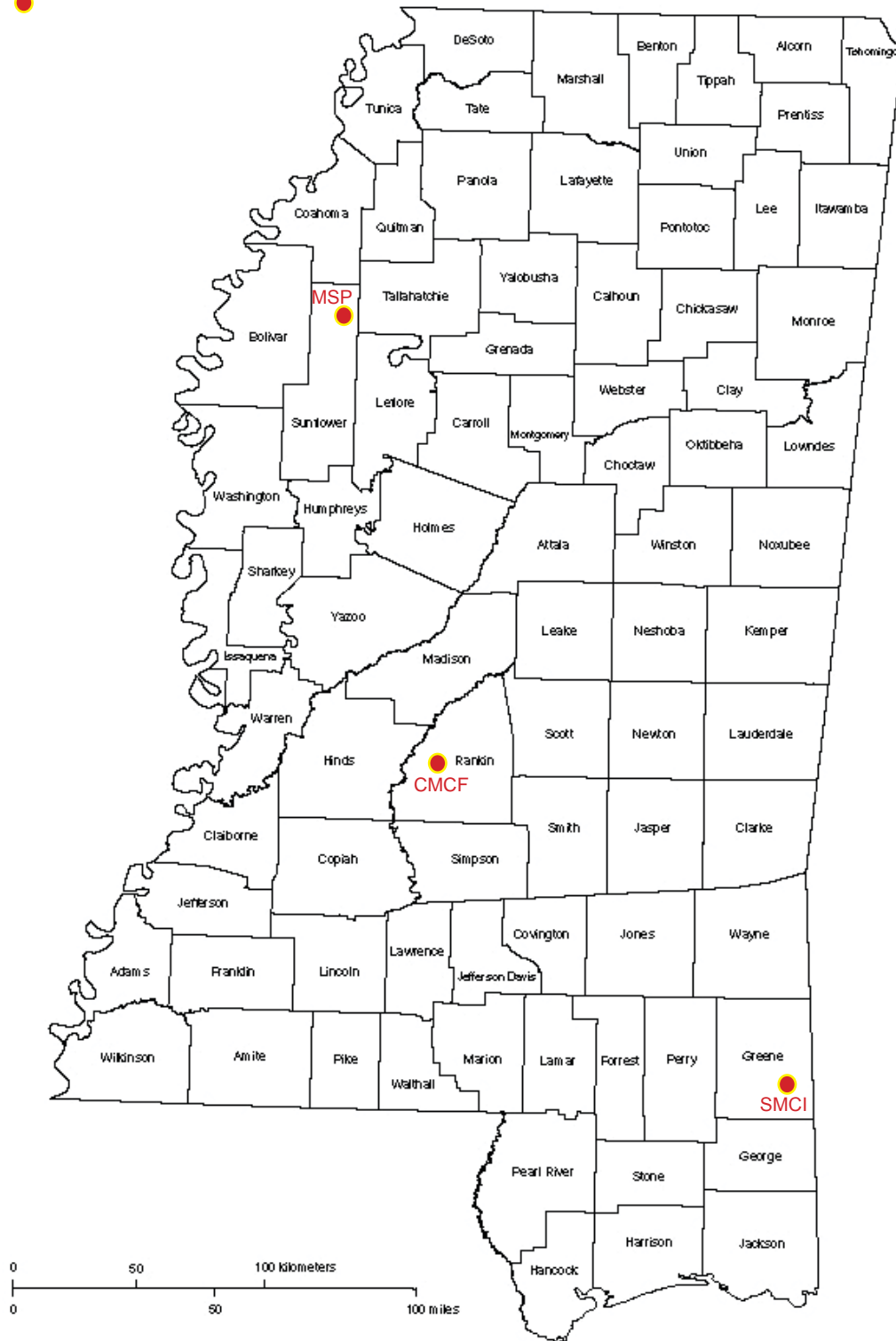

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# INSTITUTIONS

The Mississippi Department of Corrections (MDOC) Division of Institutions has oversight of three state institutions, 15 county regional facilities, four private prisons, the Classification and Records Division, Treatment and Programs Division, and Agriculture Enterprises. The division is under the leadership of Deputy Commissioner Archie Longley.

The Mississippi State Penitentiary (MSP) is the state's oldest Institution, opening in 1901. It is located on approximately 18,000 acres at Parchman in Sunflower County. MSP has a capacity of approximately 4,648 beds, which consist of 58 support buildings and seven different housing units, ranging in size from 56 beds at Unit 42 (Hospital) to 1,521 beds at Unit 29.

MSP houses only male offenders who are classified as protective custody, administrative segregation, cell telephone management, administrative long-term segregation, and death row. MSP custody levels consist of minimum, medium, and close custody. All male death row offenders are housed at in Unit 29. MSP offenders provide more than 100,000 hours of free offender labor each year to adjacent municipalities and counties, as well as assisting other state agencies. There are approximately 986 (filled/vacant security and non-security) employees at MSP.

MSP is also the largest state prison and is the base for the Agricultural Enterprises Division. In 2013, 5,722 acres of vegetables, rice, wheat, soybeans and corn were farmed. The institution was reaccredited by the American Correctional Association in November 2011.

The Central Mississippi Correctional Facility (CMCF) sits on 171.3 acres in Rankin County and serves as the receiving and classification facility. All offenders sentenced to the Mississippi Department of Corrections are brought to CMCF, except for male death row inmates who are processed at MSP.

Each offender undergoes a needs assessment and is screened, tested for STD, HIV, and other medical conditions, provided a psychiatric evaluation and questioned regarding his or her educational level. The results, along with the offender's conviction and institutional behavior, help establish the offender's classification.

CMCF is the second oldest state facility, having opened in February 1986. It includes 13 housing units with a capacity of 3,665 beds. Of the three state prisons, CMCF is the only facility to house female inmates, including minimum and medium security, close custody and death row. The prison also has minimum and medium custody male offenders, as well as some maximum custody offenders (close custody). CMCF also houses male offenders with special needs and male offenders who are disabled and require medical treatment in the Jackson area. In December 2012, a Youthful Offender Unit was opened for offenders 17 years and younger and vulnerable 18 and 19 year olds. The institution was reaccredited by the American Correctional Association in November 2011.

The South Mississippi Correctional Institution (SMCI), located in Greene County, is the newest state facility, having opened in 1989 and occupies approximately 360 acres in Leakesville. There are 16 housing units at SMCI with a capacity of 3,282 beds.

SMCI houses male offenders classified as minimum, medium and close custody levels as well as protective custody and long-term segregation.

SMCI is the first prison in the state to receive accreditation from the American Correctional Association. It was ACA reaccredited in August 2011. It also is the first state prison in Mississippi to be accredited by the National Commission on Correctional Health Care.

SMCI is the only state institution with a para-military “boot camp program.” The Regimented Inmate Discipline (RID) Program seeks to divert offenders from criminal behavior and instill work ethics through rehabilitative and treatment elements as well as community service work projects.

## MISSISSIPPI PRISON AGRICULTURE ENTERPRISES

Mississippi Prison Agricultural Enterprises (MPAE) is responsible for the farming operations at Mississippi State Penitentiary (MSP) in Parchman and at the South Mississippi Correctional Institution (SMCI) in Leakesville. The majority of the farming activity takes place at MSP.

The MPAE program utilizes offender labor in all areas to decrease inmate idleness and to cut budget costs for taxpayers. Minimum and medium custody offenders are given the opportunity to participate in planting, harvesting and processing the crops. During FY 2013, offenders worked 419,340 hours in the Agricultural Enterprises program.

On a daily basis, MPAE work approximately 110 A-Custody offenders in their operation. During the vegetable season, MPAE will work an additional 150 offenders per day in the vegetable fields and processing.

MPAE is comprised of Row Crop, Vegetable Crop, Farm Shop, Feed Mill, Poultry, Processing and Cold Storage operations.

For the crop year 2013, MPAE planted approximately 1,056 acres of vegetables, 115 acres of rice, 571 acres of corn, 811 acres of wheat and 2,692 acres of soybeans.

The corn is utilized by the Feed Mill in the production of feed for the Poultry operation. During FY 2013, the Feed Mill produced 9 different feed rations for chicken consumption and produced 1,541 tons at a price to livestock of \$487,959.80.

Approximately 10,000 bushels of the rice harvested each year is milled by MPAE and fed to the offenders.

The Processing operation is comprised of both hand processing and machine processing by the offenders. Processed vegetables are blanched and frozen in 10-pound bags for offender consumption.

The Cold Storage operation stores all frozen vegetables processed by MPAE and all frozen products purchased from outside vendors and is responsible for filling orders for the three main facilities and the Community Work Centers and Restitution Centers. The Cold Storage operation handles in excess of 6 million pounds of product annually.

The Poultry facility is in full production with 36,000 layer hens. For FY 2013, a total of 312,909 dozen eggs were delivered to MDOC Food Services with a non-cash value of \$370,667.

In FY 2013 non-cash sales for vegetables and egg sales were \$1,079,853. The FY 2013 total pounds of vegetable non-cash sales were 1,598,982. There were 312,909 dozen non-cash egg sales.

Vegetable value is based on the USDA Atlanta Market Report. All processed vegetables and eggs were provided to the MDOC Food Service Department. MPAE sold vegetables to employees to generate cash dollars of \$4,033.00.

The inventory of commodities carried over from FY 2013 had a value of \$417,972. This figure includes feed mill inventory, seed, fertilizer, and chemicals not expended during FY 2013.

On June 30, 2013, the Agricultural Enterprises Special Fund had a balance of \$748,395.92. Cash income received for Agricultural Enterprises, including deposits in transit, totaled \$2,620,400.74.

The work staff includes 17 positions. At the present time 15 positions are filled and MPAE has four (4) contract employees with MDOC.



MPAE is comprised of Row Crop, Vegetable Crop, Farm Shop, Feed Mill, Poultry, Processing and Cold Storage operations.

# ALCOHOL & DRUG TREATMENT PROGRAMS

## TREATMENT & PROGRAMS

The Division of Treatment and Programs plays an integral part in the day-to-day operations of Mississippi's correctional facilities. This division is responsible for providing programs and services to the offenders that are designed to improve the offender and his chances of success upon release from incarceration and also to comply with court orders pertaining to the rights of the inmates.

The Division of Treatment and Programs is making every effort to provide treatment and programs to the maximum number of offenders possible while operating within allocated funds.

Treatment and programs provided include Education, Alcohol and Drug Program, Pre-Release, Administrative Remedy Program, Inmate Legal Assistance Program, Religious Programs, Library Services, and Recreation Services.

## EDUCATION PROGRAMS

The underlying philosophy of the MDOC Education Department is that every human being, regardless of background or station in life, has worth, dignity, and potential. The degree to which any individual effectively functions in society is directly proportionate to the extent to which he realizes his self-worth and develops his potential.

MDOC constantly strives to increase the number and quality of program offerings. The mission of the schools is to offer classes which will enable all offenders who desire training to enroll, succeed and leave prison with the skills needed to succeed in the workplace.

Education programs offered to offenders in FY 2013 resulted in 4,551 offenders successfully completing General Education Development (GED) – 493, Vocational Trades – 644 and Alcohol & Drugs – 3,414.

Academic and Vocational classes are offered at the three state institutions, Mississippi State Penitentiary (MSP), Central Mississippi Correctional Facility (CMCF) and South Mississippi Correctional Institution (SMCI).

Academic classes are offered at the Youthful Offender Unit (YOU) school to offenders 17 years and younger and vulnerable 18 and 19 year olds as determined by the Commissioner of Corrections.

Vocational night classes are offered at MSP through Mississippi Delta Com-

munity College and at SMCI through Jones County Junior College.

Offenders who wish to enroll in college classes may take correspondence courses. College tuition fees are the responsibility of the offender.

All academic and vocational instructors are licensed by the Mississippi Department of Education (MDE). Current licensure is maintained at all times.

In the Adult Basic Education (ABE) program, priority is given to the offenders court-ordered to obtain their GED. The academic classes are governed by MDOC policy and procedures and by regulations of the State Board for Community Colleges. When possible, classes are departmentalized and grouped according to ability levels ranging from basic literacy through adult secondary (GED). The length of time a student is enrolled varies, with the ultimate goal being the attainment of a GED certificate.

In FY 2013, the ABE program exceeded the state minimum performance measurement requirements in all academic areas.

Vocational programs are governed by MDOC policy and procedures and by regulations of the Mississippi Department of Education. Vocational instructors are licensed by the MDE. Current licensure by the vocational instructors is maintained at all times.



## ALCOHOL & DRUG TREATMENT PROGRAMS

The mission of the Alcohol and Drug (A&D) Program is to provide treatment and rehabilitation services to offenders who have a history of substance abuse problems or who commit alcohol and drug related crimes. The goal is to correct the offender's attitude and behavior that supports criminal thinking.

These services are provided to offenders who are court ordered alcohol and drug treatment, parole pending completion, Intensive Supervision Program, MDOC referrals or volunteer.

The A&D Program also provides after-care information and referrals as needed regarding primary and secondary A&D treatment facilities, Alcoholics Anonymous, Narcotics Anonymous and Cocaine Anonymous meetings and home placement.

In FY 2013, 3,414 offenders enrolled/served in A&D programs with 1,520 completions.

### A&D Programs in Facilities

Mississippi State Penitentiary provides a long-term program for offenders with at least six to thirty months remaining on their sentence. The Alcohol and Drug Therapeutic Community Treatment Center units house 432 therapeutic treatment beds, group rooms and classrooms with clinical staff office space adjacent to each housing unit.

A traditional 12-week A&D program based on the principles of Alcoholics Anonymous is provided for special needs (disability) offenders. A 12-week basic A&D education only program is provided to eligible offenders housed in high risk, lockdown, and protective custody units.

Central Mississippi Correctional Facility provides both a 12-week traditional A&D program and a long-term program (6 months to 12 months) for female offenders. In addition, a 12-week treatment program is available for special needs (disability) male offenders.

South Mississippi Correctional Institution provides both a traditional 12-

week A&D program and a long term (6 month) program for general population offenders. An A&D component is provided in the Regimented Inmate Discipline (RID) Program.

The Residential Substance Abuse Treatment (RSAT) Program is operated in the Flowood, Pike and Quitman Community Pre-Release Centers for offenders who are within six months to one year of release. The offenders provide work in the community during the day and attend A&D classes in the evening.

A&D treatment programs based on the principals of Alcoholics Anonymous are offered in 14 Community Work Centers. Offenders provide work in the community during the day and attend evening treatment sessions weekly.

The Flowood Community Work Center offers a 12-week A&D program for female offenders who are expiring their sentence, paroling or are being released on Intensive Supervision Program (ISP).

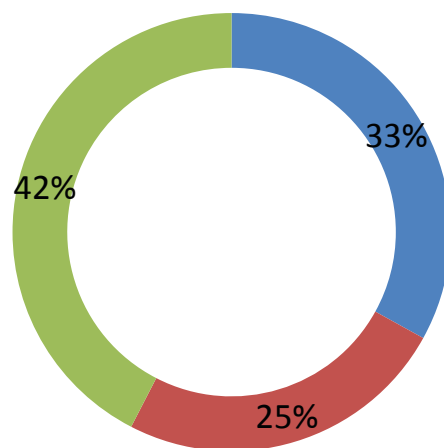

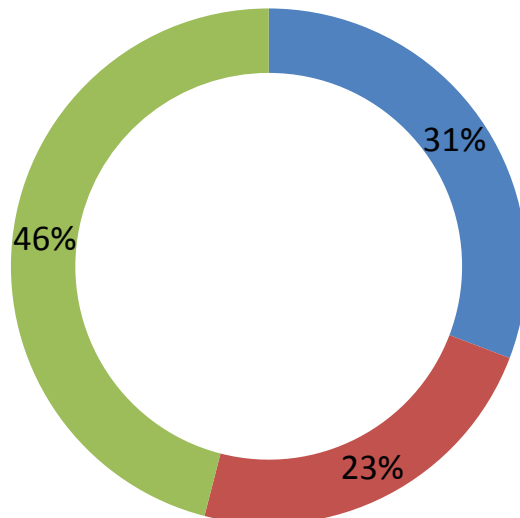

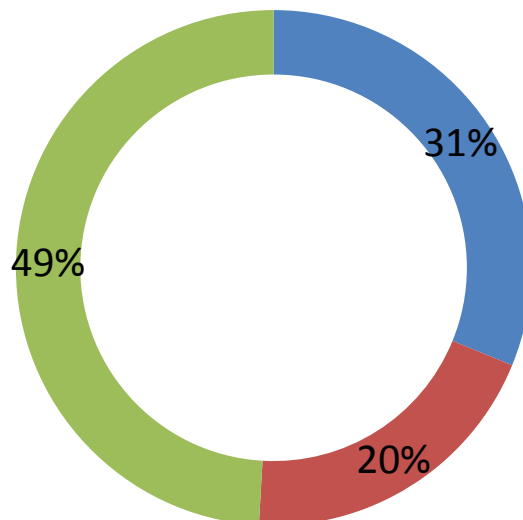

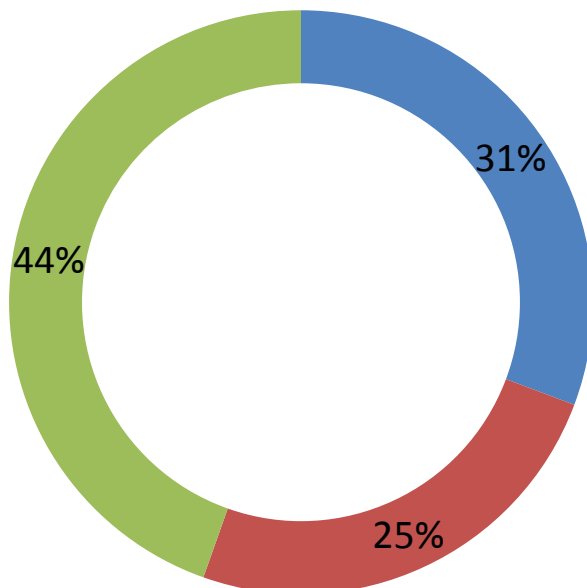

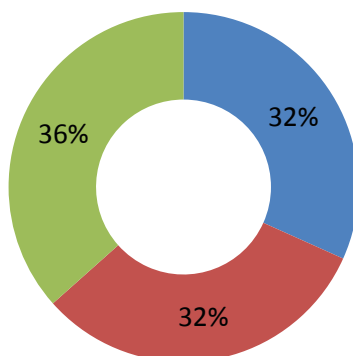

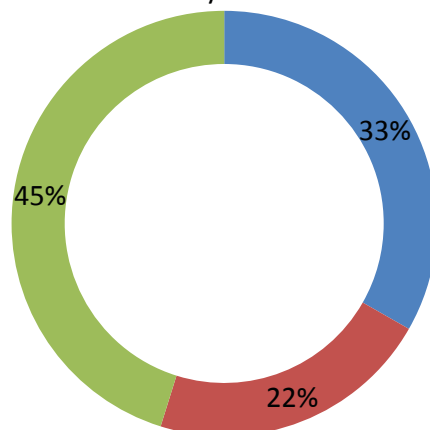

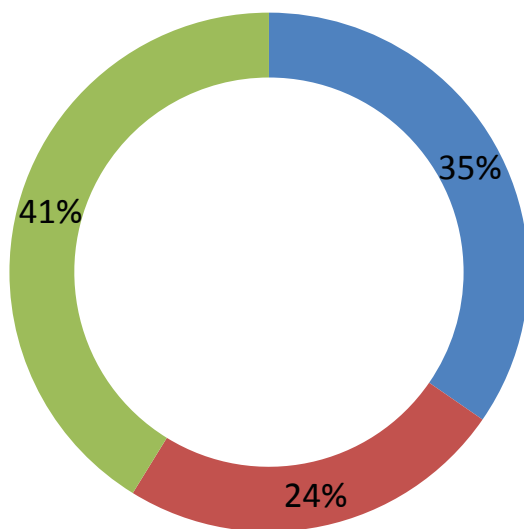

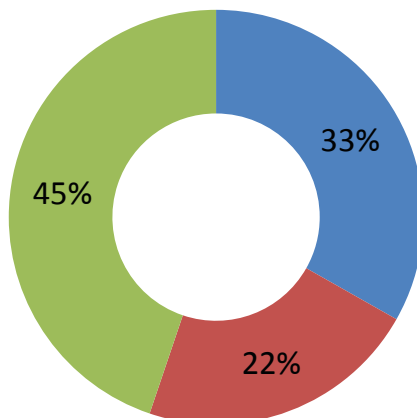
